Food Recovery in California

SB 1383 requires that by 2025 California will recover 20% of edible food that would otherwise be disposed, to feed people. The law directs the following:

- Jurisdictions must establish food recovery programs, maintain records and report to CalRecycle
- Commercial Edible Food Generators (CEFGs) must arrange to recover the maximum amount of their edible food and maintain records
- Food recovery organizations must maintain records



Interagency Agreement with Contra Costa Health Services

Tier One CEFG Inspection Services:

- Annual stand-alone, on-site inspections
- Follow up inspections
- Outreach and education
- Written documentation to generators of any violations
- Complaint investigations
- Training, research, meetings and coordination
- Reporting



On-Site Inspections

SB 1383 sets out specific generator requirements:

- Donate the maximum amount of edible food that would otherwise be disposed.
- Maintain a written agreement with all food recovery organizations that pick up or receive edible food.
- Maintain monthly records of type, frequency and pounds of food recovered.



Proposed Interagency Agreement Budget

August 1, 2022 – March 31, 2024 for a not-to-exceed cost of \$50,447

RecycleSmart has a Fiscal Year 2022-23 Board-approved SB 1383 budget of **\$134,000** (using CalRecycle SB 1383 grant funds) that includes Tier One monitoring and inspections. The maximum reimbursement to CCHS for the current 22-23 FY is **\$33,631**.
