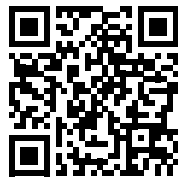


State Laws for Businesses

CA State Law SB 1383 and RecycleSmart’s Organics Reduction Ordinance (21-1). Composting organics is now the law in California! Organic material accounts for more than half of California’s waste stream. Greenhouse gas emissions caused by the decomposition of organic material in landfills contribute to climate change.

All businesses are required to:

- Separate from trash all recyclables, food scraps, paper towels and paper napkins.
- Annually educate employees on how to separate organics and recyclables, and how to properly sort all materials.
- Place recycling and organics containers in all areas where landfill containers are present (except restrooms), with proper signage.
- Certain food-generating businesses are required to donate excess edible food to feed people. Visit RecycleSmart.org/FoodGenerators.
- If you self/back haul your recycling and/or organics, your business is required to maintain records. Visit RecycleSmart.org/Recycling-Reporting.

SB 1383 also requires local jurisdictions to monitor contamination and proper sorting by performing annual route audits. RecycleSmart or its contractors may be in the area assessing your carts and bins.

Overflowing Containers

Lids must be completely closed or your business may be charged for overages.

E-Waste

Call Republic Services to schedule a pick-up for a fee, or take most electronics to Concord Recycling or Rapid Recycle for FREE. Visit RecycleSmart.org/hhw.

Bulky Items

Disposing of large appliances and other bulky items in or near your bins is not permitted, and may cause access and safety issues for service. You can schedule special pick-up services (rates vary by item) by calling Republic Services at 925.685.4711, or check out local business reuse, repair and thrift resources at RecycleSmart.org/reuse.



Hazardous Waste

Eligible businesses can take paint, fluorescent bulbs, chemicals and other hazardous materials to Central San’s Hazardous Waste Facility located at 4797 Imhoff Place in Martinez **for a fee**. Visit CentralSan.org/hhw.

Batteries

Batteries contain hazardous materials that start fires and are harmful to the environment. Drop off batteries **for free** at a convenient retail partner. Visit RecycleSmart.org/hhw.

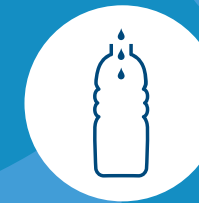
Food should be loose (no bags) or in BPI-certified compostable bags or clear plastic bags.

Empty, Clean, and Dry Recycling

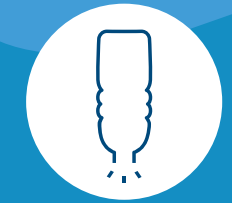
If your recycling or organics cart/bin is contaminated with unacceptable materials, it may not be serviced and your business may be charged a go-back fee.



Empty. Remove any remaining food or liquid.



Clean. Wipe or lightly rinse the item.



Dry. Shake out excess moisture or air dry.



Commercial Food to Energy Program

RecycleSmart partners with Republic Services and East Bay Municipal Utilities District (EBMUD) to collect food from commercial businesses and turn it into energy! Learn more at RecycleSmart.org/FoodWaste



The commercial Food Scraps to Energy Program is different than traditional composting ("green organics cart"). To participate, place only food scraps, paper towels, and paper napkins into your "food scraps" cart. **Landscape material is not accepted. If you have landscape trimmings, please contact SustainabilityAdvisors@RepublicServices.com.**



Important: Compostable plastics such as cold cups and utensils **do not break down** completely. All compostable plastics should go in the black landfill cart or bin.
